<p align="center">Course Content: Key Content Standards and Course Objectives</p>	<p>The objectives of this course are based on the standards outlined in the Grades 9-12 <i>Sequenced Pattern of Instruction</i>. Students will begin with a focus on the events, people and philosophies upon which the United States government is based, including the role of religion in the United States and the world. The causes and consequences of some of the great revolutions will also be studied and compared.</p> <p>In addition to the U.S. and World History and Geography content standards for grades 9-12, students will have opportunities to demonstrate the 9-12 social science intellectual, reasoning, reflection and research skills.</p> <p>*Open entry/open exit</p>

The role of religion in the founding of American (11.3). 2. Events surrounding the founding of America and the philosophy of government described in the Declaration of Independence (11.1). <p><u>World History and Geography Standards:</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Students analyze the instances of nation building in two regions of the world (10.10). 2. Students relate the moral and ethical principles in ancient Greek and Roman philosophy, in Judaism and Christianity to the development of western political thought (10.1). 3. Compare/contrast the English, American, and French Revolutions (10.2). <p><u>Historical and Social Science Analysis Skills</u> Students will demonstrate the grades 9-12 social science intellectual, reasoning, reflection and research skills.</p>

Students will complete all assignments with a minimum of 70% accuracy for a "C" grade. 2. The supervising teacher will be satisfied with the quality of the student's work. 3.
