### I. Textbook Assignment Options:

- B. *World History for a Global Age, Book 1 (5.0 credits)*
  - Read Chapters 2-5.
  - Complete chapter exercises (**omit**: “Understanding Global History”)
  - Complete one Extension Activity listed below.
- C. *History of the World (1.0-5.0 credits*: direct instruction or course contract)
- D. *Experiencing World History, Part I (5.0 credits)*
  - Read chapters 6-8, 16, 18-20, 22.
  - Complete all “Stop and Review” and “Chapter Review” exercises.
  - Complete one Extension Activity listed below.

### II. Extension Activity Options:

1. Research a major religion of your choice. Write a 4-paragraph essay that includes the following information, using Writing Rubric Exp. III:
  - Basic beliefs and practices
  - The religion’s founder(s)
  - What, if any, persecution for the believers
  - Any special observances and/or holidays.
2. Choose three inventions from the Industrial Revolution. Write a 4-paragraph essay in which you describe each invention and explain how it has helped American society. In addition, keep a log of your activities for one day. Explain, in one paragraph, how your day would have been different if you had been living before the Industrial Revolution. Use Writing Rubric Exp. III.
3. Create a map of Europe between 1914 and 1918, indicating the countries and major cities. Site the location of three major WWI battles on the map. On a separate sheet of paper, write a 4-paragraph essay explaining how these battles had an affect on WWI. Use Writing Rubric Exp. III.
4. Teacher generated activity, approved by the site administrator.
