(2.1) • Create an expressive composition, focusing on dominance and subordination. (2.5) 3. Historical and Cultural Context Component: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Students analyze the role and development of the visual arts in past and present cultures throughout the world, noting human diversity as it relates to the visual arts and artists. (3.0) 4. Aesthetic Valuing: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Students analyze, assess, and derive meaning from works of art, including their own, according to the elements of art, the principles of design, and aesthetic qualities.
